 - (1) President: doesnt give percentage of the people that benefitted but can see Fall 2019 allocated ~\$16,000; pretty open to changing the amount based on this

Housing and cost of living

- Reports from students indicated that some apartment complexes are significantly lowering rent for the 2026-2027 year, while others are still struggling to fill units.
- At the same time, many students have shared that rising utility costs are offsetting these savings.
- I raised this concern directly at the Action Council.
- The University Senate Chair explained that many housing providers rely on private providers, (eg: water systems) rather than city utilities, which adds third-party fees.
- This information helps explain the higher bills students are seeing and is shaping ongoing housing advocacy efforts.
- It was recommended that some of these concerns be taken to City Administrators.

Housing and transportation listening session

- Organized a listening session focused on housing and transportation challenges.
- Worked with Ashley Darnell from the Office of the Dean of Students, through our Advisor Jeff Stefancic, to ensure students were informed about university resources for off-campus renters.
- Student feedback was carefully documented and will be shared with the Action Council at the next meeting.
- A common concern was the difficulty graduate students face when trying to book campus shuttle services.
- I followed up with Auxiliary Services, and updates to the system are planned to improve access and usability.

Healthy Boiler Initiative

- To support mental health and overall wellbeing, PGSG partnered with Purdue Farms to offer graduate students a 25% discount on salad kits from March 7 to May 9.

- To mark the 40th anniversary, PGSG is also launching a food voucher program.
- This includes 40 dining court vouchers available from October 2026 through April 2027 and vouchers usable at the Purdue Memorial Union during August and September 2026.
- The goal is to help students maintain healthy habits even during demanding academic schedules.
- Vouchers will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis, with priority given to first-time recipients.

Leadership and continuity

- Continued biweekly meetings with the PGSG Advisor to review progress, discuss challenges, and plan next steps.

Student leadership collaboration

- Met biweekly with the Student Trustee and the PSG President to coordinate efforts on shared student concerns.
- Discussions have focused on housing, transportation, and long-term priorities such as alumni engagement and career planning after Purdue.

Graduate insurance advocacy

- Spring-admitted students reached out with concerns about affording health insurance after registration deadlines had passed.
- Worked with Vice Provost Oliver-Jischke to connect students with appropriate resources.
- With guidance from the PGSG Advisor, students were directed to HR Benefits, where questions were addressed promptly.
- In response to continued confusion around recent insurance changes, Senator for the Agricultural and Biological Engineering department, Autumn Derry and I are working with PUSH to organize an Insurance 101 workshop.
- The goal is to help graduate students better understand their coverage and how recent changes affect their care.

Childcare support

- Authored legislation to reinstate the PGSG Childcare Grant following news of the potential closure of one campus daycare center.
- Worked with the Vice Provost of OGSPS to identify additional childcare grants that graduate students can apply for ahead of the anticipated closure.

Parking concerns

- Met with Steven Carn, Senior Manager of Parking Services, to discuss parking challenges faced by graduate students.
- Discussed a proposed initiative to waive certain parking fines, with a potential rollout in April.

Cross-government coordination

- Met biweekly with the PSG President and Vice President to align efforts on shared concerns such as housing pressures and access to off-campus transit during the summer.

University Senate and sustainability

- Attended a University Senate meeting where joint sustainability legislation was introduced.
- Resolution No. FA25-R001, “Supporting a University-wide Sustainability Task Force for the Student Body”, was tabled for discussion at the next meeting.
- Currently working with PSG’s Sustainability Committee to prepare for discussion on the Senate floor.

Governance and policy

- Reviewed the Financial Code of Operations and proposed revisions aimed at improving clarity and strengthening governance.

PGSG anniversary planning

- Led weekly ad hoc committee meetings in preparation for the anniversary reception scheduled for February 20.
- Planning has focused on logistics and coordination.

Mental health and wellbeing

- Met with the Dean of Students and the Vice Provost of Student Life to discuss mental health initiatives, Mental Health Action Week, and ways to extend coverage and outreach to graduate students on both the West Lafayette and Indianapolis campuses.

Committees and councils

- Attended Fiscal Board meeting to discuss budgetary processes.
- Attended the Action Council for Housing and Student Wellbeing meeting and working with the PGSG Senate Chair to invite Auxiliary Services staff to a future Senate meeting.
- Attended Graduate Council meeting with university partners to ensure graduate student perspectives remain represented.

Administrative engagement

- Attended Coffee and Conversation with Vice Provost Oliver-Jischke and established connections to support outreach to graduate students at Purdue Indianapolis.
- Attended the Advisory Committee meeting with President Mung Chiang.

Endowment and long-term financial planning

- Worked with Purdue for Life, the Director of SAO, and the PGSG Advisor to move PGSG's endowment account from OGSPS to Student Life's BOSO domain. This transition is an important step toward PDOG and the creation of a dedicated endowment fund for PGSG.

Purdue for Life collaboration

- Met with Purdue for Life to discuss graduate-focused career and alumni engagement.
- Shared the need for career support that reflects the wide range of graduate pathways, including industry, policy, and non-academic roles.
- Discussed alumni involvement through mentoring, panels, and small-group conversations.
- Identified potential pilot initiatives focused on long-term graduate student and alumni connections.
- Emphasized early alumni engagement and the importance of graduate student input in shaping programming.
- Raised graduate-specific transition topics such as stipends, taxes, visas, and negotiating first employment offers.
- Highlighted the importance of inclusive engagement for international, first-generation, and underrepresented graduate students.
- Positioned PGSG@40 as a platform for sustained collaboration rather than one-time engagement.

- Attended meetings of the Ad Hoc Subcommittee and actively worked on proposed updates to the Financial Code of Operations (FCO). Gave suggestions based on review of the bylaws and constitution to the LRC.
- Budget preparation for the upcoming fiscal year is currently in process.
- Financial records from the last quarter are being reviewed and compiled to ensure accuracy and alignment with reporting requirements.
- History Wall project: Significant historical content has been collected; materials are currently being collated, with additional updates expected.
