# Support for UC Academic Workers on Strike

WHEREAS, On Monday, November 14, University of California academic workers organized through United Auto Workers (UAW) began an open-ended strike across all ten UC campuses. 1,2 35,654 workers voted to authorize the strike, representing 98% of those voting. This includes 17,000 student researchers. The UC academic workers are demanding that UC ends their unfair practices, preventing them from earning a living wage (including cost of living adjustment), full childcare coverage, and covering the visa fees the UC system imposed on international students; and

WHEREAS, When academic workers at other universities organize into unions and win better working conditions and higher wages, it benefits academic workers everywhere else. For example, in January 2022, soon after union activity and success at Harvard, New York University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Columbia University, Princeton University increased graduate student fellowship and stipend rates by an average of 25% to \$40,000/year for doctoral candidates (read more)<sup>3</sup>; and

WHEREAS, Purdue graduate students are currently facing similar issues to UC academic workers. For one, as the cost of living continues to rise, our stipends have not kept up. In fact, considering real time spent working, most graduate student workers at Purdue University make less than \$13.44/hour! MIT's Living Wage Calculator estimates that this is the minimum for a single adult without kids to afford a minimum standard of living; and

**WHEREAS,** The Purdue Graduate Student Government is the advocating and legislative voice for the Purdue graduate student body.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** PGSG Senators will be encouraged to present this resolution to their graduate student organizations/associations (GSO/As), explain why it is important we support academic workers organizing at other universities, and ask GSO/As and grad students in their departments to publish similar statements in support of UAW-UC academic workers.

# **Example Statement in Support of UC Academic Workers on Strike**

### To the Purdue Community:

On Monday, November 14, <u>University of California academic workers</u> organized through United Auto Workers (UAW) <u>began an open-ended strike</u> across all ten UC campuses. 35,654 workers voted to authorize the strike, representing 98% of those voting. This includes 17,000 student researchers. The UC academic workers are demanding that UC end their unfair practices, preventing them from earning a living wage (including cost of living adjustment), full child care coverage, and covering the visa fees the UC system imposed on international students.

We, the Purdue Student Graduate Government (PGSG), pride ourselves as being the advocating and legislative voice for the Purdue graduate student body. Purdue graduate students are currently facing similar issues to UC academic workers. For one, as the cost of living continues to rise, our stipends have not kept up. In fact, considering real time spent working, most graduate student workers at Purdue University make less than \$13.44/hour! MIT's Living Wage Calculator estimates that this is the minimum for a single adult without kids to afford a minimum standard of living.

It is important that PGSG and graduate students at Purdue support academic workers at other universities. When academic workers at other universities organize into unions and win better working conditions and higher wages, it benefits academic workers everywhere else. For example, in January 2022, soon after union activity and success at Harvard, New York University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Columbia University, Princeton University increased graduate student fellowship and stipend rates by an average of 25% to \$40,000/year for doctoral candidates (read more). Supporting academic workers at other universities, such as UC, supports ourselves here at Purdue.

As representatives of the graduate student body, we cannot stress the importance of not just words of support, but also material support. PGSG has passed a resolution, "Support for UC Academic Workers on Strike" to both declare our support for fellow academic workers at the University of California and donate \$100 from our discretionary fund to their strike support and hardship fund. We encourage department graduate student organizations, other Purdue student organizations, and individual Purdue academic workers to donate to the fund as well.

We would also like to acknowledge efforts from organizations and grassroot student advocacy groups at our own university. <u>Grad Rights and Our Well-Being (GROW)</u> has been campaigning for a <u>Living Wage at Purdue</u> (\$31,200/year stipends for all grad students now and \$41,600/year by 2026) and <u>collecting stories</u> that express the urgent need for higher wages.
